New Outreach From New Communities

LZF grantee <u>Muslim Justice League</u> shares Lenny's dream of making the world a better place to live, work, and thrive.

In these difficult political times, The Lenny Zakim Fund is proud to support The Muslim Justice League (MJL) in its work to make the phrase "and justice for all" a reality. In keeping with its mission of educating, organizing, and advocating for human and civil rights threatened under national security claims, MJL has now expanded its focus to address emerging federal policies that threaten the human and civil rights of Muslim American citizens, immigrants, and refugees."So many folks have reached out," says MJL Executive Director, Shannon Al-Wakeel, "and most prominently a number of churches, including the Arlington Street Church in Boston and others."

MJL has seen an uptick in interest and support as a result of national media coverage of the Muslim ban and other policies affecting local Muslim communities. As travel concerns increase in the Muslim community, MJL continues to offer "Know Your Rights" workshops for communities Muslim and non-Muslim - on rights regarding law enforcement. "To expand our impact," Al-Wakeel says, "we recently trained a group of volunteer attorneys to present this content, and we're also training law students on how to present these workshops as well."

The Muslim Justice League is also focused on the potential of the new administration to cast spurious allegations against Muslim civil society, which may result in asset freezes and malicious prosecutions. Al Wakeel says "Support from The Lenny Zakim Fund has been invaluable in allowing us to sustain this work."

<u>RIM</u> Responds to Increased Deportation Fears

The Lenny Zakim Fund is honored to support the efforts of grantee Refugee Immigration Ministry (RIM), whose mission is to align interfaith congregations across Eastern Massachusetts in support of newly arrived asylum seekers. LZF - Where We've Been and Where We're going

In light of the recent changes in immigration policy, including increased media attention to undocumented immigrant deportations, Ruth Bersin, Executive Director of the Refugee Immigration Ministry (RIM) sees first-hand the impact on asylum seekers. "We have many more people coming in for assistance," she says, "and they are very afraid."

RIM's programs for immigrants and asylum seekers include case management, job preparation, and spiritual care givers, as well as clusters made up of representatives from several congregations in a given community who volunteer to support new arrivals in an interfaith, cooperative process. They offer a community-based opportunity for clients to begin their new lives. RIM Clusters are currently in Arlington, Chelmsford/Lowell, Lexington, Marblehead, Metro-North, Newton, North Shore, and Metro-West. Clusters work with asylum seekers to provide housing, food, transportation, and community support, until the client is able to work. "The clusters are also bringing faith groups together in the community, and they are learning about each other," Bersin says. "LZF support has been very important for RIM in providing these services,"
